IEEPA Tariffs – Action May Be Required to Preserve Refund Rights Valuation

The U.S. Supreme Court is currently reviewing the legality of tariffs imposed under the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA), with a decision expected in the near future. In the meantime, a recent ruling from the U.S. Court of International Trade (CIT) has important implications for importers seeking potential refunds.

On December 15, the CIT declined to issue an injunction that would halt the liquidation of entries involved in IEEPA refund cases. However, the court confirmed that it retains the authority to order reliquidation and refunds even after liquidation occurs if the Supreme Court ultimately invalidates the tariffs. Importantly, the U.S. government has acknowledged this authority and cannot later reverse its position.

This ruling makes timing critical. Importers may need to take proactive legal steps now to preserve their rights to potential refunds. In particular, filings under the CIT's residual jurisdiction may be required to maintain standing, even if liquidation has already taken place. Missing key deadlines could significantly limit recovery options.
